


# When Your Flight Training Stalls, Just Keep Flying

I was born in California, but when I was young my parents moved back to Peru. My older siblings stayed in California, so I grew up in between Peru and U.S.A. I was always traveling and my favorite place on earth was and still is an airport. I always loved the smell and sound of the big airliners, but now I have come to fall in love with the small Cessna I train in

When I was young, I looked up to the pilots flying such heavy aircrafts and believed they had the best job in the world, but I never thought I would be where I am now: On my way to becoming a pilot.

When I was 21, I was living in California and my sister passed away. She was my best friend and my world came crumbling down so I decided to








A good friend of mine knew about my situation and informed me of an airline holding Flight Attendant interviews. They offered a high salary which would allow me to care for my mother and pay off the funeral debt.

This was a prestigious airline in South America, so I had to pass a rigorous selection process. Then I had to undergo an intense 4-month training and I would only be offered the job if I passed all the exams. I had no aviation background and I was competing against people who went to school to become flight attendants. I had to study extremely hard and would sleep less than 5 hours per night, but it was worth it! I was offered a FA position and my beautiful journey into becoming a pilot started and I had no idea.

I fell in love with my job and discovered that my first true love was aviation. I was curious to know more about the Airbus I worked on: what was going on in the cockpit? How did this heavy aircraft fly? What were the flaps and spoilers for?



Out of the hundred pilots I worked with, I only flew with 3 female pilots. The lack of women in the cockpit was obvious and I started to question why more women were not attracted to becoming pilots. Later I started questioning why I had not become a pilot. I believed that the lack of female pilots and misrepresentation in aviation hindered me from discovering my passion earlier in life, so I decided to become a pilot and show the world that women also belong in the cockpit.

I decided to save all the money I could for a year and in 2018 I made the brave decision to use all my savings to move back to California and become a pilot. Things did not go as planned since I

spent all my savings in the first 4 months due to the high cost of living in California and finding an apartment for myself. My flight training had to pause before it had even started. This was my first "stall" and I had no idea how I could afford the high cost of learning to fly, but I did not give up. I decided to wait and work hard to save up. I stretched every dollar I earned and after a few months I decided to enroll in ground school at Glendale Community College. I did not have enough to start flying and had no idea how I would make it but all I knew is that I needed to start somewhere and learning the theory was the first step. I passed ground school with an A and was lucky enough to get a spot in the flight lab. I had saved enough to enroll in the first flight lab, I did not know how I would pay the next semester but just kept flying.

I was lucky enough to have a great CFI and have learned so much from him. On August 23, 2019 I had my first

solo and was blessed to have my family supporting me on that day. It was the best feeling in the world and I knew I was meant to fly.

A new semester began but I was placed with a new instructor. I felt he did not have my best interest in mind, so I decided to ask for a new instructor. It was very disappointing to learn I had wasted



expensive hours of flying with that instructor, but it was more disappointing to have to stop flying while a new instructor was being assigned to me. Around this time, I had also lost my job and had to pay my bills with the

money I saved for flight training.



Around November 2019 I was assigned a new flight instructor, but unfortunately, he didn't have much time to squeeze me in between his students and again I wasn't flying. He went on holiday vacation, but he promised he would be back in January of this year and would make time to fly with me, but by the time

he was available I had run out of money. I told him I would have to pause to be able focus on my new job, work overtime and try to save up more money. My flight training had hit its "second stall" and on top of it all, I received terrible news in my personal life that left me emotionally exhausted.

Two months later Covid-19 hit us, and my flight school was temporary closed. I was not flying, I did not have the money to fly nor did I have a flight school. I started to question if leaving everything to become a pilot was worth it, I started to question if I would be able to do this or if I could ever afford becoming a commercial

months, but I got back in the airplane. I worked hard and saved every penny. My flight school is still closed

pilot. I was emotionally drained and decided it was best to give up on this dream. It hurt me to feel I had failed at the one thing I wanted the most.

I hurt me to look up in the sky and see an airplane flying so I decided to block everything related to aviation to ease the pain.

Fortunately, this did not last too long because I came to my senses. I have never been a quitter and I was not about to start now. I learned it would be more painful to give up on aviation than to overcome all the obstacles. My flight training had come to a stall, but I was going to take the controls and keep flying.

Flying does not start when you are in the airplane, it is a process that starts way before, when you are preparing for that flight. So I decided to start by changing my perspective and then develop a plan to get back in the airplane. It took me 5 long



and will open next year, so I contacted my first instructor for independent lessons. I knew I had to keep flying and this past July 28, I flew my first flight away from the airport.



I also understood the importance of not rushing into the airlines and enjoying flight training, so I was lucky to take my mom on my training flight to Catalina Island.

I have come to learn that many student pilots decide to quit aviation when they pause their flight training

and now I understand why. This is why my goal is to inspire other female student pilots to pursue their dreams.

I decided that if I was coming back to aviation, I had to be committed and make a strong comeback. Once I had something to account for, I rejoined all the aviation groups I was once part of including the Ninety-Nines. I wanted to come back strong and lead through my example. On August 11, 2020, I flew my first long cross

country (from Whiteman Airport to French Valley Airport) and that was also the day I had my first Ninety-Nines meeting after my small break from Aviation. I am thankful for this group because it creates a space for support among female pilots and hope to have the opportunity to inspire others. I know how hard it is to stop flying and to keep motivated when everything is going wrong, but I can assure you that working hard to get back in the plane is the most empowering feeling in the world.

Life is like flying: It is beautiful and exciting but you can encounter some turbulence along the way, you must take the controls and keep going. If your flight training stalls, remember to keep flying!


Michael plans to use his Scholarship for his Multi rating and plans to earn his Commercial rating.
